Parents will find the subtly droll stories as entertaining as children, and a child who reads chapter books will find especially rewarding.

Abstract: A curriculum for preschool nutrition education is designed around 7 basic nutrition concept areas: food and nutrients, nutrient needs, nutrition and health, nutrition and the life cycle, food handling, food selection, and food as a resource. The primary emphasis is on learning through experiences requiring children to use their senses. There are 7 unit plans (collections of activities which can be used to teach a concept based on a chosen subject) and corresponding daily lesson plans which use some of the suggested activities from the unit plan to structure a day's activities. Each lesson plan lists goals, behavioral objectives, materials needed and learning activities. Also included are annotated bibliographies of preschool children's

chapters are: (1) "An Introduction to Food Foundations," discussing the values of foods and eating, adult roles in facilitating food events with children, and the kinds of learning children gain from a variety of food opportunities; (2) "A Framework for Learning about Food," focusing on key principles for formal and informal curricula, learning and teaching considerations, and the learning process; (3) "Approaches to Children's Food Learning," introducing the six approaches and including sample activities; (4) "Food and Nutrition Issues and Information," discussing nutrition guidelines, infants' and children's nutritional needs, special food needs, meal planning, safety and food hygiene, and information for parents; (5) "Making Decisions about Food Foundations,"

including information on children's rights, negotiating food foundations, sample food education and nutrition policies, and a management process for food issues in early childhood programs. (Contains references and recommended readings organized by chapter.)(KB)
